Muslim Girls Making Change come to Montgomery

Montgomery Center—"America, the golden brick road to success," said high school student Hawa Adam in the opening lines of "American Dream." "A place they had seen on TV screens, books and magazines."

As Adam spoke, she shared the stage with Kiran Waqar and Lena Ginawi, three-fourths of a Burlington-based slam poetry quartet. Ginawi's back was to

"The Star Spangled Banner" as Adam and Waqar traded words through the bulk of the poem.

Their performance swings through the images of the American Dream, white picket fence and all, before coming to realities like discrimination and low wages, and the expectations placed on first-generation Americans that, according to their poem, mandates doctors and CEOs, not poets.
